Rename Caboolture West - Your Chance to Name a City!

Published 17 June 2021

It's the most talked about development in South East Queensland and it hasn't even started, which is why Moreton Bay Regional Council wants to get its name right from the outset.

Locals can now make place name suggestions for the area known as Caboolture West, which will become a city the size of Mackay City over the next 40 years.

Mayor Peter Flannery said Council wanted the planning for this major development area to be right before the first shovels even hit the ground.



"That starts by choosing place names which both the existing residents and new residents can identify with and be proud to call home," he said.

"You might suggest a title reflecting the area's culture and history, or an acknowledgement of distinguishable features like the sweeping views to the Glass House Mountains and rich agricultural surrounds, you might even suggest we retain an existing place name.

"It's up to you to come up with names for this new city and the suburbs within it."

The Caboolture West area will be eventually be home to roughly 70,000 people and bring with it a host of business, employment, education and lifestyle opportunities as well as a diverse range of housing options and community and recreational facilities.

Division 12 Councillor Tony Latter said while the community will help drive this process, it won't be put to a popular vote.

"This isn't going to be anything like the Boaty McBoatface saga, we genuinely want to hear what locals think and will only consider authentic suggestions," he said.

"To oversee this process we're establishing a Place Naming Committee and calling for nominations from passionate locals who want to be part of this moment in history.

"The Place Naming Committee will compile a shortlist for Councillors to help them decide the new name for Caboolture West, the suburb names within it and their boundaries.

"Council will then take that to the State Government for formal endorsement.

"There will also be an opportunity for locals to join one of three focus groups to help redefine the boundaries of the existing suburbs most affected by future development: Bellmere, Rocksberg, and Upper Caboolture.

"As development progresses there'll be plenty of opportunity to comment on features like infrastructure and town centre design, but before all that the most important thing is to get online now and make your naming suggestions heard."

Your role

As part of the focus groups you will:

- gather local stories, history and photographs from your community prior to a workshop
- attend one 6-hour workshop (to be held early September on a week day during business hours)
- be an advocate for the project and build awareness across your local networks.

At the workshop, you will work with other community members and Council staff to understand the preferred alignments of the new boundaries between existing and new suburbs. While Council will make the final decision about the suburb boundaries to be put forward to the State Government for gazettal, the focus groups will provide important local knowledge to guide these decisions.

THE IMAGE OF THE CITY

"There seems to be a public image of any given city which is the overlap of many individual images." - Kevin Lynch

The physical form of a city can be classified into five elements:



Paths

Corridors along which we move and view the city. These corridors may be streets, walkways, transit lines, canals, railroads. For most people these are the most predominant elements in their image of their city.



Nodes

Important strategic spots in a city into which we can enter and that are important focal points of intensive activity and interaction.



Edaes

Linear elements generally considered paths. They are boundaries or linear breaks in continuity like shorelines, railroad cuts, edges of development, walls. Edges may be barriers separating one region, district or locality from another.



Districts

Medium to large sections of the city that are two-dimensional and recognisable as having some common identifying character. We may mentally note that they are entering into a district.



Landmarks

Physical objects that are types of point references, such as a building, sign, stone or mountain. Some landmarks are distant and can seen from many different angles and distances (making them able to be used as radial references). Landmarks may be regional, district or local. They are frequently used as fundamental elements of identity and a way to structure our journey around and through the city.

Moreton Bay Regional Council is seeking your ideas on a name for the newest city in Moreton Bay Region, to give it a strong community identity and ensure it appropriately reflects the character of this rural area.

Mayor Peter Flannery said while it would be a home for future residents, he wanted locals to be the first to put forward suggestions.



"Its current nickname, 'Caboolture West' doesn't really cut it, so we're putting out a call to the community to help us put a name on the map; one that captures the essence of this area and the future city it will be," Mayor Flannery said.

"Naming a city and suburbs is no easy process - so people should consider this as a once in a lifetime, history making opportunity to get involved.

"The final names chosen for the new development will help support the creation of liveable and desirable communities.

"When thinking about place names we need the remember that they are more than addresses or tools to help us navigate to locations; they tell us a story about the place and its people.

Division 12 Councillor Tony Latter said this will be a community-centric process.

"However that does not mean we'll select the name by popular choice; we will follow stringent assessment criteria," he said.

"To oversee this process we're establishing a Place Naming Committee and calling for nominations from interested locals who want to be part of this moment in history.

"The Place Naming Committee will compile and recommend a shortlist for Council consideration to help inform their decision on a new name for Caboolture West, the potential future suburbs within it.

"Council will then work with the State Government to formalise selected suburbs."

Over the next 40 years, this area is expected to become Moreton Bay Region's biggest emerging community bringing with it new business, employment, education and lifestyle opportunities, as well as diverse housing options and outdoor experiences.

To get your creative ideas flowing maybe look for inspiration in names that honour local people and their contribution to community, consider the unique climatic or natural features of the region, acknowledge the local or Indigenous heritage or capture aspirations for the future.







To allow students to explore why their town is important.

In this activity students are asked to explain, in writing, why they think their town is important to them? What is it that makes the area they live special?

Activity sheets have been provided for students to write their responses.

Drawing their town

In this task students need to recall familiar streets, shops, features of the community to map their local area and where their home lies within it.

Maybe use a scenario to help them, for example: Mum and Dad forgot how to get home from your school. Draw a rough map of what you can remember, to show Mum and Dad the way home.

If you think you drive past a BIG water tower to get home, draw a big water tower on your map.

What do you think your town needs?

Students can get creative with this task. Allow the students to engage in conversation with their classmates (especially if there are students that live in the same area as one another). They can choose things they would want to add to their current hometown or things they would want if they were designing a whole new town.

Some ideas:

Ask students to chat, think, create and draw, and then explain their choice.

Adapt this task for lower primary learning by replacing the writing tasks with drawing or conversations.

Naming their town

The students need to name their new town. Encourage students to create a name that will connect them with their town. Their name should be easy to pronounce and spell, easy to remember and has a meaning to the individual and/or their family. It might relate to their cultural background, the local landscape (e.g. rivers or mountains), someone famous from the area (local person of historical significance), it might even relate to their aspirations for what their town will be.

My Town Activity One Page 3 of 3

To engage the class in a group activity building a huge, new creative town using wooden building blocks, Duplo or recycled materials from home.

This task is a class friendly activity suited to a large open area. Inviting young minds to group play, form connections, build confidence in decision-making and physically show themselves what their minds created.

Required materials

- · Building blocks, Duplo or recycled materials from home (e.g. cardboard boxes, paper rolls, etc)
- Figurines, for example: people, animals, plants, cars, trucks and bikes

Task description

- 1. In a large open area of the room gather the required materials. Ask the students to sit in a big circle, placing the materials in the centre.
- 2. Explain to the students the objective, invite them to participate in building their dream town. This may be done as one big groups in a few smaller groups.
- 3. Keep them engaged by asking questions like:
 - a. What would you really like to see built in your town?
 - b. What do you think your family would want to see in your town?
- 4. Start in one area of the town and grow it from there, involving every individual equally.
- 5. Once the students are content with their town, let them add the figurines and allow free play.
- 6. While they are playing ask them to chat to each other about what a cool name for their town would be.

Suggestion

Keep the town set up for a good part of the day, allowing students to come back and play as often as they can. Prompt students to make up scenarios, create stories and make a connection with their creation.

Create a 'Building Our Town' wall. Take a photo of each town and then pin it up for everyone to enjoy and talk about.





To work together as a team and explore how artwork can represent their ideas about the world through creative play.

Using the required materials, groups will work together to create a 3D town. Group discussion will determine what infrastructure the town will have and where it will be placed. This task welcomes creativity, imagination, group interaction, lots of colour and a brief class discussion once completed - just discussing the groups choice of name and backstory.

Required materials

- Scissors
- Glue stick
- · Coloured paper
- Project paper
- · Arts and crafts materials, e.g.
 - Paddle pop sticks
- Pom poms
- String
- Stickers
- Paint
- Recycled materials from home
- Cellophane wrap
- Foam balls



Task description

- 1. Set the task out in groups of 3-4 students, supplying all groups with a good selection of materials.
- 2. Request the students do a quick draft lay out of their town (on the below activity sheet).
- 3. Students must agree on what the town will have and where to place it, i.e. roads, streets, parks, pool, shops, school, houses, etc.
- 4. Encourage students to discuss with each other why they think their town needs what they have chosen.
- 5. Once they have all their equipment together and agree to the plan, they can start piecing together their creation.
- 6. The final task is for groups to agree on a name for their fresh new town and explain why that name is suitable.

Suggestion

Create a class discussion that welcomes story building, role playing, creating a town family, developing an adventure plan, maybe the students' town has buried treasure that they need to create a step-by-step map for finding the treasure!

Ask fun facts about the town. Allow questions and feedback from other groups members.

To allow students to explore open-minded thinking in relation to naming places. And to allow students to incorporate something they are already learning (e.g. use of adjectives) into something fresh, colourful and creative.

Required materials

Task description

- 1. Gather online images of features that they feel would create a great and innovative future town.
- 2. Students create an online collage using these images.
- 3. Ask students to come up with words or phrases that best describe their future town. Thinking about adjectives that describe how it feels (e.g. fun, exciting), how it looks or smells (e.g. clean, modern, lots of trees/gardens), what makes it special (e.g. no two buildings look the same, designed by children, vegetables grow on all the roof tops).
- 4. Once completed, ask children to come up with a name that best describes their future town based on how they described their town.

Suggestion

Create a class discussion that welcomes storytelling, role playing, creating a history for the place or describing a community that lives there and what they do for work or play.

Allow questions and feedback from other students.





To explore why places are special to others using inquiry and research to pose questions and collect data from family members.

This task is a homework-based activity which engages the student in an interview process with his/her family members. Asking key questions, writing the answer on the activity sheet provided, bringing them back to class on the same day as everyone else and working as a team to go over their answers.

Required materials

- · Provided family member interview activity sheet
- Pencil
- · Family members to interview



Task description

- 1. Provide the activity sheet to the students.
- 2. Ask the students to discuss in class what they predict their family members will say, before they interview them.
- 3. Encourage the students to complete the activity sheet at home by pretending to be a reporter (role play) and interviewing 1-2 family members.
- 4. Once all the activity sheets are returned, engage in a class discussion about the responses the students have collected from their family members (You may want to allow students to read their completed activity sheet to the class and have other students ask questions).

Suggestion

Students may want to draw a picture of the family member/s they interviewed.

Use prompting questions to help facilitate question time, for example: if Sam has just read that his sister likes where she lives because there is an amazing ice-skating rink near their house, you could prompt with: 'Oh wow, I had no idea they had an ice-skating rink in that area. Who loves to ice-skate?'

- · Avoid names that are offensive, racist, derogatory or demeaning.






